

Rene King Irene Norman King who died in May was part of the old Poynings Barnes family and was born in 1 Royal Oak Cottages in 1922. All her life she lived & worked (at the RO tea gardens & at Chorlton Bros at the old brewery) in & around Poynings. After she married Rex they moved to Fulking, then to a little cottage where the pub terrace is now & then to the new 5 Mill Close. Eventually, they moved to a cottage next to the school & then to Hurst when their 3 children were grown up. Rene always came back to her Poynings roots, either visiting friends, the Church or regularly tending all the family graves. She travelled either by bus or walked from Hurstpierpoint into her late 80's, being fit & able up to a few months before she died at 90!

Cider Frank Sadly we lost Frank Salvat this April. He was a well known character from Newtimber where he had lived with his wife, Barbara, who predeceased him. Frank was a former British athlete, representing GB in the 5000 M in the 1960 Summer Olympics in Rome. He had been a magazine designer in London. He originally ran for Hinchley Harriers, now Hillingdon Athletic, club & they attended his funeral as well as fellow Olympians. He was 78.

Rectory, Newtimber from 1958. The elegant Georgian house was exactly what they were looking for with ponds, fields for the horses and a magnificent Tulip tree. They both loved gardening.

Lambert served during the war as a naval officer and right hand man to the Admiral of the fleet during the relief of Malta. Retiring at 65 from his work as a Lloyds Underwriter and Committee member enabled him to spend many happy hours designing & making furniture, including an oak bench seat for the churchyard at Newtimber. He and Ros were enthusiastic members of the "Evergreens" for the over 60s, hosting an annual afternoon tea with smoked salmon sandwiches on the terrace, the last held this summer only a week before he died aged 91.

Lambert loved life, had huge amounts of energy and a good sense of humour which was appreciated by his many friends. He set up a charity to support the development of integrated medicine and was a Trustee of the Lewes New School. His memorial service was held recently at Newtimber Church where he worshipped. Also he experienced belief and surrender to God through Subud.

He is greatly missed by his daughter, three grandchildren and two great grandchildren as well as many nephews, nieces and close friends.

GOODBYE

Margaret Cutress

Poynings residents old and new were sad to hear of Margaret's death in May, just a few days short of her 87th birthday.

Tony and Margaret Cutress moved to Twitten Bend as newlyweds in 1949 and she quickly integrated herself into village life and over the years introduced keep-fit, Scottish dancing, the youth club, Evergreens and the village fete and "all things Poynings."

Margaret was always willing to offer help and I recall her knocking at my door one day offering a lift to the ante-natal clinic which we were both attending, thus starting a lifelong friendship.

In the days when Poynings had a Cub pack, it was she who was Akela and affectionately addressed as that by 60 or more boys right up until her death.

Margaret was a mainstay of the church, where she was church warden for over 25 years and in the early 1970's she was Chair of Governors at Albourne School and then at Downlands for many years. Margaret avidly supported Poynings Cricket Club, originally when Tim and Matt were playing and until only weeks before her death she attended just about every match and proudly watched her grandsons carry on the family tradition.

In the early 1970's Tony and Margaret bought a maypole and introduced maypole dancing to our part of Sussex. At many local hostelries on summer evenings it was brought out to raise money for Coppercliff hospice. The maypole is still in existence.

As well as bringing up four children Margaret supported Tony at Forfars bakery and also helped manage Coppercliff, her childhood home, which had become a hospice following her parents' death. She charmed many of us into helping with Coppercliff teas at the weekends.

On Tony's retirement, he and Margaret instigated a monthly tea party at home to entertain the older residents of the villages. Evergreens was born and has gone from strength to strength and is a lasting legacy to them both. Our monthly get together now moves between local houses and up to 35 "oldies" are ferried in by willing helpers and treated to a slap-up tea and a social afternoon. Margaret continued to attend until last April and not a meeting goes by without her being fondly remembered. Despite her active life Margaret was very much a family person, close to all her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren and her room at Red Oaks was crammed full of photos, cards and letters. At her funeral the church had been beautifully decorated by the grandchildren and great grandchildren with flowers from Twitten Bend. My final memory of the service was of her great grandson knocking on the coffin with his ear pressed to the side!

Jean Margaret Tighe

Jean was born on April 12th 1926 in a bungalow at the top of the valley of Devils Dyke. Her parents were Bernhard (Bunny) and Margaret (Mags) Hollingdale. They lived for a short time at the Forge in a small dwelling behind the now Sussex Four Wheel Drive. They then moved to a little cottage opposite the old shop and then Jean attended the little village school. Whilst living in the cottage she gained two sisters, Ella and Anne,



following in family tradition both being born on the 12th of the month. She then went to Hurstpierpoint St Lawrence School when she was eleven years old as it was a secondary modern school then. At the age of fifteen she went to work for a family called Littleboys who lived at Fox Ash (familiar to some). Then the war started and life changed - all these Canadian soldiers came and were stationed at Terry's Cross at Woodmancote. She met and fell in love with Jo (Joseph Tighe). She went to Canada in July 1946. After a short illness Jo died on 12th May 1961 and she returned on the 30th November 1961 and lived with her mum and dad at Dyke Farm Cottage. As all the locals know she came back with all her eleven children (including a set of 'Irish twins'). She was a lioness where her children concerned and with very little money (no handouts then), her job was to protect them and she did a good job. In 1964 she moved to 5 Mill Close and lived there ever since. Number five was a place all her children knew they could return to no matter what problems they had in their lives and her hospitality was open to all her children's friends. In due course she acquired a lot of grandchildren and great grandchildren and on her last count she had 26 grandchildren and 33 great grandchildren and she knew all their ages and birthdays! She loved the village and when life became easier she used to love going to Evergreens, the Oldies Night and all the village events. Sadly at Christmas 2010 her daughter Eileen died. It broke her heart but she still went to the Oldies Night that Christmas. Her health recovered but she still continued to go to village events. Sadly the last one being when Chantal pushed her to the Village Fete at the vicarage on Saturday June 8th. Ella told her not to go but she said, 'I am going' and sadly for so many people, not just her family, she died on June 12th, following in family tradition.

Even more worryingly both cup exits occurred without a ball being bowled as Poynings could not raise an XI.

In a long term bid to try and arrest the fall in player availability and numbers in PCC, a colts section was formed. This grew from a very cold and occasionally snowy Easter cricket camp with a handful of young people to having over 20 young people on the books and having played a number of friendlies against other local clubs by the end of the season. Fracking for Shale Gas in Sussex - A view from Mike What could possibly be wrong if oil companies provide fuel from the shale under much of Britain? Well, in my view, quite a lot. Before we even think about contamination of the water supply. the vast amounts of water needed in the fracking process and the harmful chemicals that are used, we should consider the benefits of leaving this fossil fuel in the ground. All fossil fuels create additional CO₂. As we are going to have to cope with a rising CO₂ level and the effects of climate change, surely it would be best not to increase the level further. Coal will be used even if shale gas is also available. Although the price of gas fell in America because of the availability of shale gas, America does not sell gas on the world market as we do. Before discussing alternatives, some more about fracking. Throughout the summer there was a large anti-fracking protest camp at Balcombe. This camp was able to exist because it was supported by most of the residents of Balcombe. The villagers supplied food and water and helped in the legal fight against the drilling company, 'Cuadrilla' who eventually withdrew their further planning application to drill. The protest camp has now gone but Cuadrilla may return when planning rules are changed in their favour. Wind and solar energy are modern alternatives but are only a partial answer. More people producing their own power, together with insulation measures, will reduce the national requirement for power generation by other means. It is a good investment to use these methods to reduce our consumption of electricity. My electric PV panels and also solar thermal tubes to heat water results in lower energy bills. It is a nice feeling when my electricity supplier pays me.


