## GOODBYE

## **Johnny Johnson**

William 'Johnny' Johnson, died earlier this year, on 6<sup>th</sup> June (D-Day) after a brave battle with cancer, over the last few years.

He was born in 1926, on a farm on the Blackmoor estate, in Hampshire, and moved to Brighton with his family when he was a young lad.

Johnny met Poynings girl Ella Hollingdale, and they married in January 1954, whilst he was still in the army, after WW2. He would come back to the village on leave, staying at Ella's family home at Glebe Cottage, and always enjoyed going to the Royal Oak for a Watneys brown ale and a game of darts with the locals. Johnny and Ella settled in Poynings after his army career ended, although being recalled to go off to the Suez crisis interrupted life for a time.



For many years, whilst their children were small, he worked for 'Felco Hoists', at Crawley, driving a lorry to all parts of the country, delivering cranes. Along the way he gathered a large stock of tales to tell about his travels. He then went to work for British United Airways, at Gatwick, and remained at the airport till he retired, working for British Caledonian, and finally British Airways.

When he did retire, he always wanted to keep busy doing something, and took on various gardening and driving jobs in Poynings and Fulking.

He had always been a good driver, and it was very hard for him to finally accept giving up driving, when his eyesight started failing in later years.

He was always a good timekeeper, and hated to be late for any appointment, or to let people down. He never wanted to live anywhere other than Poynings.

Johnny was always a great family man. He and Ella celebrated their Diamond wedding anniversary in January this year and is very much missed by Ella, Sandra and Malcolm, son-in-law Bill, and grandsons Liam and Jake. Ella Johnson

### CHURCH NEWS DECEMBER 2014

Christmas is coming, and with it the chance to look back on another year and forward to the year ahead. This year we have again lost some key members of both our village and our church communities - people who we remember together every year at our All Souls service. For the first time, we enjoyed at that service the benefits of the new lighting installed in the chancel area of the Church – and also the splendid Poynings banner that now hangs above the organ, thanks to Ernie and Ian Lee Smith of Mill Close. Looking ahead, another brilliant pantomime is planned for January - see details elsewhere - and rehearsals in church have already begun. I am always amazed by the talent and sheer hard work of all who take part. There are also plans, slowly but steadily progressing, to heat the South Chapel area so that it can be better used. This project has turned out to be more complicated than we thought, which has led to delays, but a positive benefit is that some of us have learned a lot more about the de Poynings family, and we hope that our church will soon display its history more boldly for visitors to see. The Christmas message is ultimately one of hope, especially for those going through hard times. 'Fear not' says the angel, not just to Mary but to the shepherds and also to us. We need to hear that message. Anxiety and fear paralyse individuals and nations and crush creativity. We may be fearful of growing old, of being alone, or of losing what we have. Perhaps that is why 'fear not' is so commonly found in the Bible - 366 times, in fact, once for every day of the year, even in a leap year. Whatever our personal circumstances, let us seek this Christmas to hear the song and the message of the angels - perhaps in Church through the carols we sing, perhaps just in our own hearts. Remember the Church is there for everyone – do use it, and let me know if there are things that we could be doing differently or more often in 2015.

## **FARMING**

## Public Rights Of Way

We are becoming increasingly concerned about the amount of people in this village that seem to think that they have got a right to walk wherever they choose.

This is not the case.

The village is surrounded by land which is run as a working farm with both arable fields and grass fields, used to graze our 700 ewes and their lambs.

There is a very good network of footpaths and bridleways through and around the village, plus we are very lucky to have the vast area of the South Downs just a "stones throw" away.

Some of our arable fields are in an Environmental Scheme. These fields have the headlands around the outside left to grow wild to encourage the wildlife, wild birds and flowers. This cannot happen with people constantly walking around them.

When walking on a footpath through a field, please keep to it.

We have family that shoot vermin on the land, and this is becoming increasingly more difficult for them, with the amount of people straying from the footpaths

We have just put some lambs in the "Blacksmith" field, behind the Forge Garage. Within 1 week of them being out there we have had 3 cases of dogs worrying them. The footpath in this field only goes to the pond and then crosses over the weir and into the next field, joining the bridleway. This is not an "Open Access" field and the footpath does not go all the way to the bottom of the Dyke valley, where the fence is constantly being pushed down and walked through. If you come to a fence and there is no bridle gate, stile or 'right of way' sign, it is not a footpath.

When walking on a footpath through a field of stock, your dog should be on a lead.

You should, by law, keep your dog under control at all times. If it is out of sight or will not come back to you when called or whistled it is out of control and should be on a lead.

We would very much appreciate it, when walking anywhere in the countryside, if you would obey the countryside code and keep to the public rights of way.
