

Geoffrey Harris

Geoffrey passed away in the Sussex County Hospital on the 4th December 2013. His funeral was held at Worthing Crematorium on the 13th of January. He was one of the very few left of his generation who had been born in, lived in, Fulking/Poynings all their lives. Geoffrey was born in 1929 at Perching Manor, he grew up and worked on his father's farm as did his brothers. During the war, although under age, he was a member of the Home Guard where he became a crack shot winning many trophies and cups. Whilst visiting



Findon, Geoffrey met Jo, his wife-to-be. They married in 1950 and moved into the house called "The Perch" on the Edburton Road. By 1963 Geoffrey was running his own farm at Findon. As their family grew, they moved to "The Springs". With a family of three growing lads, Jo decided they had to find an additional source of income to supplement the household budget. Jo's father had a smoked fish business in Suffolk which was working very well so she decided to try this idea out. With Geoffrey's assistance they built their first small smoker. This was a success and soon they were having trial sales of the products and the business started to become established. Finally, the point was reached where Geoffrey had to decide to give up farming and concentrate entirely on the fish smoking business. His decision changed the whole of their family's lives. "The Springs Smoked Salmon" was established and grew from strength to strength. They were soon supplying the airlines and top London restaurants with smoked salmon and other smoked items. Whilst working very hard, they also found time to enjoy life with their well earned success. Occasionally he would recount fascinating stories of the wonderful holidays he and Jo had enjoyed in parts of the world which, in those days, were not as readily accessible as they are today. In 1978 Geoffrey and Jo moved to "Downmere" in Poynings and, in 1990, they retired leaving two of their three sons to run the business at Edburton, whilst the third son went to Australia and started his own successful "smoked fish" business there, following in the family tradition. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him. Tony

The Truth Behind the Dash for Gas - Film presented by Mike Airey This new documentary film by Marco Jackson was shown in the Village Hall on 21 February. It told the story of the dangers of extracting gas from shale by Hydraulic Fracturing or Fracking. A serious film compared with films of local interest that had previously been shown but as there are applications to drill within the National Park, the subject should be a concern to us all. If you

Fracking can make a lot of money for oil companies but there are concerns over the fall in property values. Illnesses have been blamed on the chemicals used. Excessive quantities of water are needed. It was because of these concerns that the residents of Balcombe supported the protest camp there last summer. On 8 March this year the Balcombe Parish Council voted unanimously to oppose drilling at the Cuadrilla site there. Objections included concern over an increase in traffic, air, water and light pollution as well as matters affecting the ecology. It is worth knowing the whole

story.

The planned 'Fracking Debate' at the village hall has had to be cancelled as I was unable to obtain speakers in favour. Sheila

Church News March/April 2014

Let there be light...

You may have noticed that the Narnia-type lamp-post over the Church steps is now working again – after some time. We have also at last obtained permission to put new and improved lighting in two key areas of the Church – the chancel, and the side Chapel. All that is to pave the way for some changes that will make the Chapel area more usable – thanks to money raised through the Pantomimes and other events. We are enormously grateful to everyone who has worked so hard – we hope to see some visible results before too long.

The roof is now mended. We were a bit worried to see water pouring down a wall inside the church in the very wet weather at the beginning of this year, but have been assured this was just from the excess of water that had accumulated in the walls. Let's hope so: it is dry now. The next task will be repair work to some of the windows and their surrounds.

Dr Keith Chittenden, our senior Church Warden, is retiring at our Annual Meeting this year after 11 years service to the Church and village, for which he and his colleague Mike Peters – sadly no longer with us - were recognised by a community award some years ago. Mike will be remembered after our service on 6th April when we will bless a new seat in the churchyard in his memory. We are grateful to them both, but now particularly to Keith as he steps down. The job of the warden is actually to represent the people of the village – so if there is anyone willing to step forward, do please ask me – or our other warden Brian Izzard - for more details of what is involved. And so we look ahead to Easter – a time of real celebration of our faith that love is stronger even than death. As most of you will be aware, our Sunday services rotate around 3 churches, but this year the Easter service on 20th April will be here in Poynings at 10am. Details of all our services are listed separately and on the website. And do remember that on the first Sunday of each month we have a family friendly service at Poynings at 10am – about 45 minutes in length, and with some activities to involve children of all ages.
