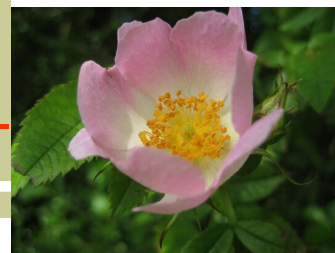

Retiring Parish Council Chairman's Update

The Parish Council has been at its full strength of five, for the last few months. Much has been achieved over the last four years. We were deeply involved in preventing the further destruction of Pondtail Wood and liaising with the National Park to have it replanted. Flood protection work has been carried out with grants from WSCC. This includes; repair of drains, renewal of tarmac paths and making and maintaining drainage ditches. Crossways roundabout has been fully restored and is currently showing off its spring flowers. We still need to employ someone to keep it weed free. A new traditional finger post is due to be installed near the roundabout. The church yard has had brambles removed, the path resurfaced and a new shed provided. Arrangements are in hand for maintenance work at Cora's Corner. A Defibrillator is now available at the garage phone box and training courses were provided. There is a core of volunteers who offer to help maintain the village. The Parish Council has supported and helped pay for improvements to the children's playground and the installation of the outside table tennis table. Cycle racks are due to be installed at the roundabout Bus Stop and Playing Field. Parish Council meetings are open to all and the minutes are available on the website: poynings.net Mike Airey.
